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# FOREWORD

At Startup Refugees, our mission is clear: to accelerate the inclusion of newcomers through employment, entrepreneurship, and skills development.

In 2025, **195** newcomers entered the open job market directly through our work, with at least **221** more finding employment through our guidance, training, and employer networks. **Thousands** participated in our different training and mentoring programmes. Behind these numbers are individuals building their lives, strengthening their skills, and contributing meaningfully to Finnish society.

This year also marked **ten years of impact**. Over the past decade, we have consistently seen that employment creates stability, confidence, and long-term belonging. Work is not only a source of income — it is a foundation for participation, dignity, and contribution. To make this impact more visible, we launched our Impact Calculator in 2025, highlighting the broader economic and societal value generated through the jobs and businesses created within our community.

Startup Refugees has always been a network and this year it continued to grow both regionally and internationally. We deepened employer collaboration, expanded our presence into new locations, and strengthened partnerships with cities, companies, and organisations committed to fair and inclusive recruitment

The operating environment in Finland changed over the year. Policy developments and public debate shaped how newcomers find work and how employers recruit internationally. Economic uncertainty and a more competitive funding landscape made 2025 a challenging year, but our operational impact remained strong.

This reinforces the importance of long-term partnerships, diversified funding, and demonstrating measurable results. Globally, displacement and labour market inequalities continue, while Finland needs talent. Our role remains to ensure skills are recognised, opportunities are accessible, and inclusion becomes a practical reality.

This report reflects a year of focused work, collaboration, and measurable progress.

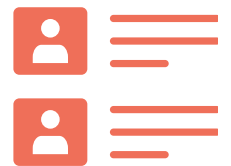

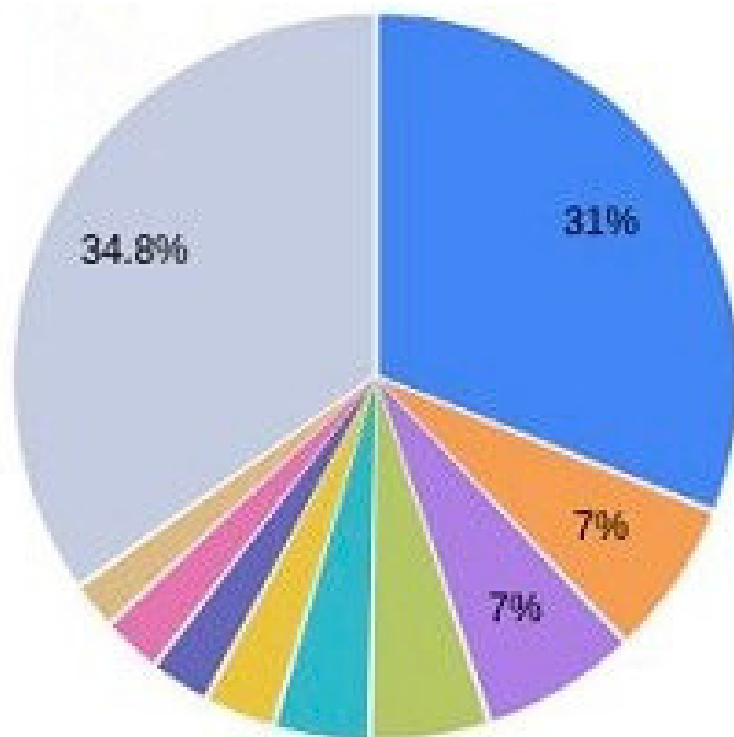

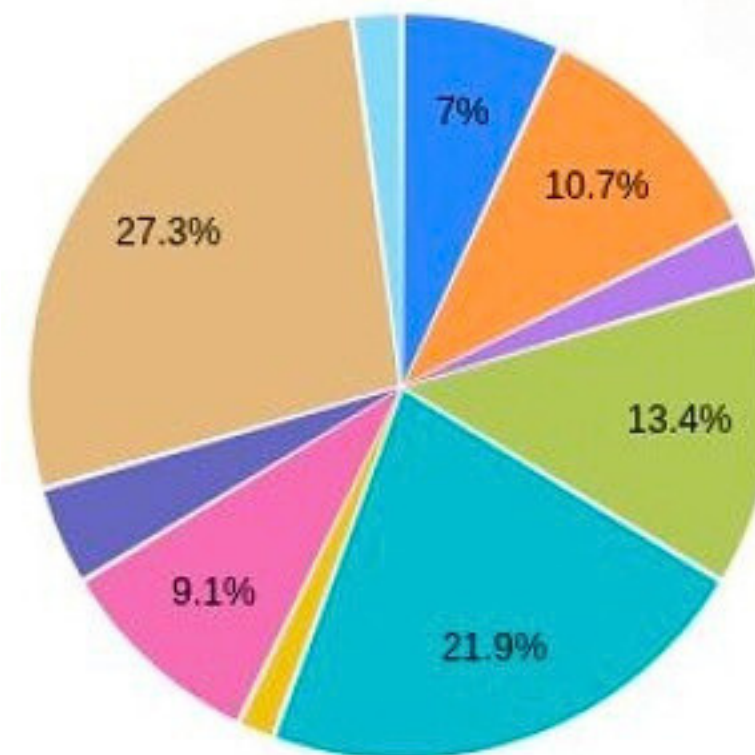

# IMPACT & VISIBILITY

## Impact Calculator

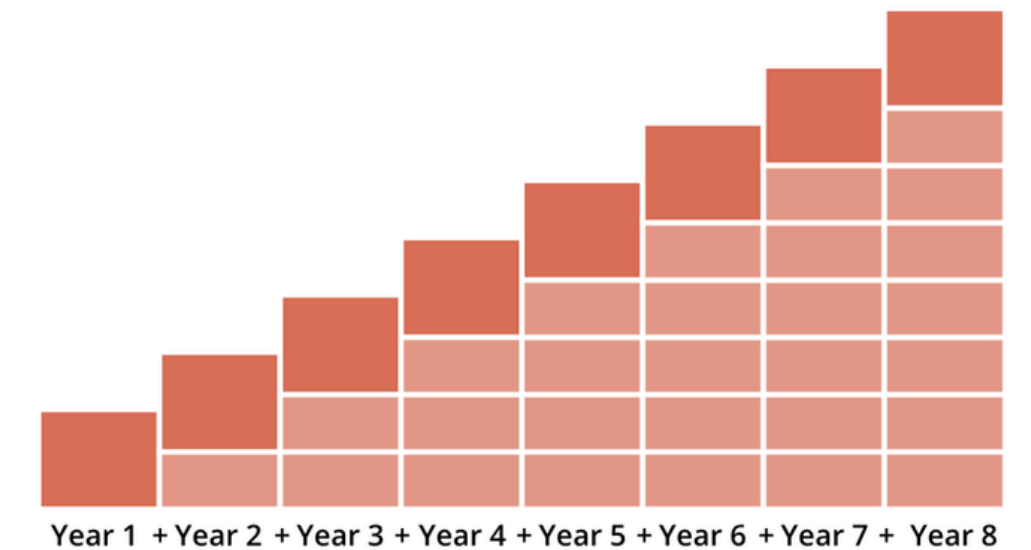
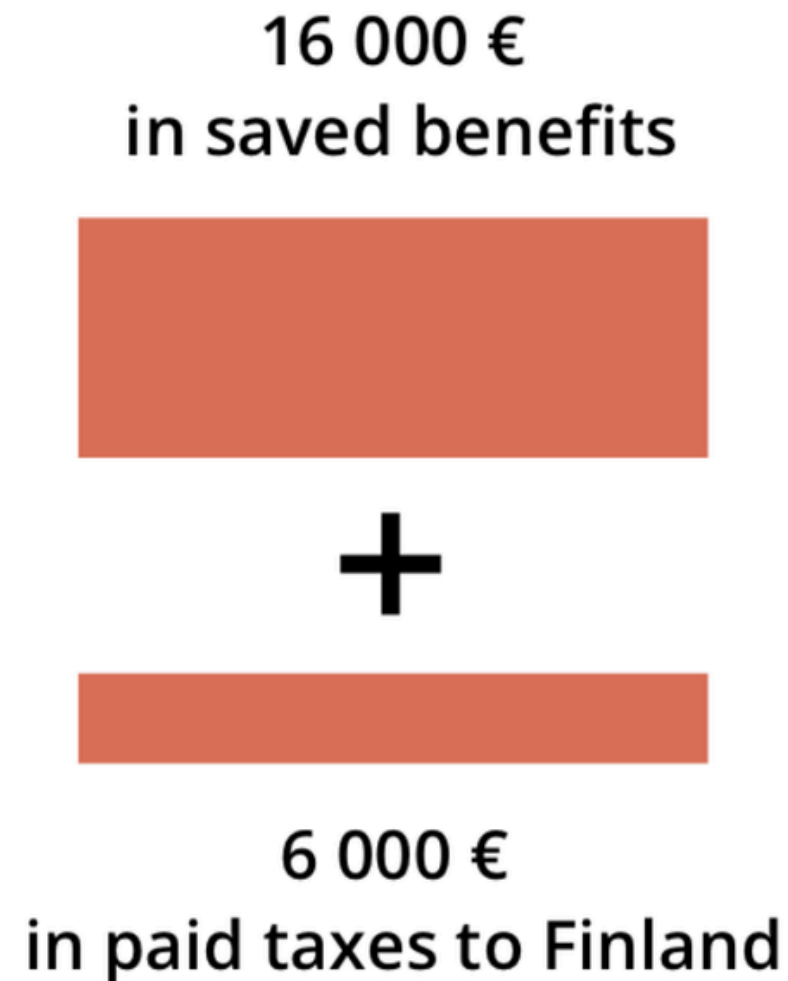
To celebrate ten years of supporting the employment of refugees and other migrants, we launched an Impact Calculator to make the benefits of employment visible and measurable. For ten years, Startup Refugees has focused on one core principle: jobs create impact.

### The calculator:

- Demonstrates the economic and societal impact
- of employment
- Highlights contributions through taxes, income and reduced reliance on public support
- Is based on cumulative employment data, including contract lengths and salary ranges

The tool was designed by data visualisation expert Pekka Pulli using employment results collected throughout the years. It provides a concrete way to understand how each job created generates wider impact for individuals, families and Finnish society.

# COMMUNICATIONS

## Social Media & Visibility

Our social media channels reached a total of 21 498 followers, compared to 18 708 the previous year, marking approximately 15 percent growth.

- 719 459 total impressions across channels
- Increased engagement around anniversary and campaign content

Startup Refugees was featured on media such as Yle, Kaleva, InfoMigrants, Helsingin Uutiset and Radio Helsinki.

In addition to digital communications and traditional media, storytelling was strengthened through a photo exhibition and a video series produced as part of the ten-year anniversary.



## From Arrival to Belonging Exhibition

We produced From Arrival to Belonging, an exhibition highlighting the journeys of refugees and asylum seekers who arrived in Finland from the Middle East in 2015 and from Ukraine in 2022. The exhibition celebrates the ways these 12 individuals have shaped and enriched their communities. A parallel social media video series under the same title featured six individuals sharing their stories in greater depth online.

The exhibition opened at the ten-year anniversary gala and later travelled to:

- Stoa Culture Center, Helsinki
- Valkea Shopping Center, Oulu
- Revontuli Shopping Center, Rovaniemi

The main portraits for the exhibition were photographed by Nora Sayyad, while additional images featured throughout the years were captured by Jussi Hellsten, Julius Töyrylä, Iiro Immonen, Nora Sayyad, and Miikka Pirinen.

# ADVOCACY

## World Refugee Week

During World Refugee Week, Startup Refugees combined advocacy and community engagement to highlight the contributions of refugees and migrants in Finland.

World Refugee Week meets Midsummer Magic at Kulttuuritalo's KULT club in Helsinki showcased performances exclusively by artists from refugee and migrant backgrounds. Including DJ Renaz, DJ Coco, West African drumming ensemble from Togo and Benin, and Palestinian dabke dance group.

The event provided a platform for refugee and migrant voices, raising awareness of their cultural, social, and economic contributions. It showcased the talent, resilience, and creativity of refugees and migrants, offering a glimpse into the richness they bring to Finnish society. Through music, dance, and storytelling, the event promoted greater understanding and unity within the community.

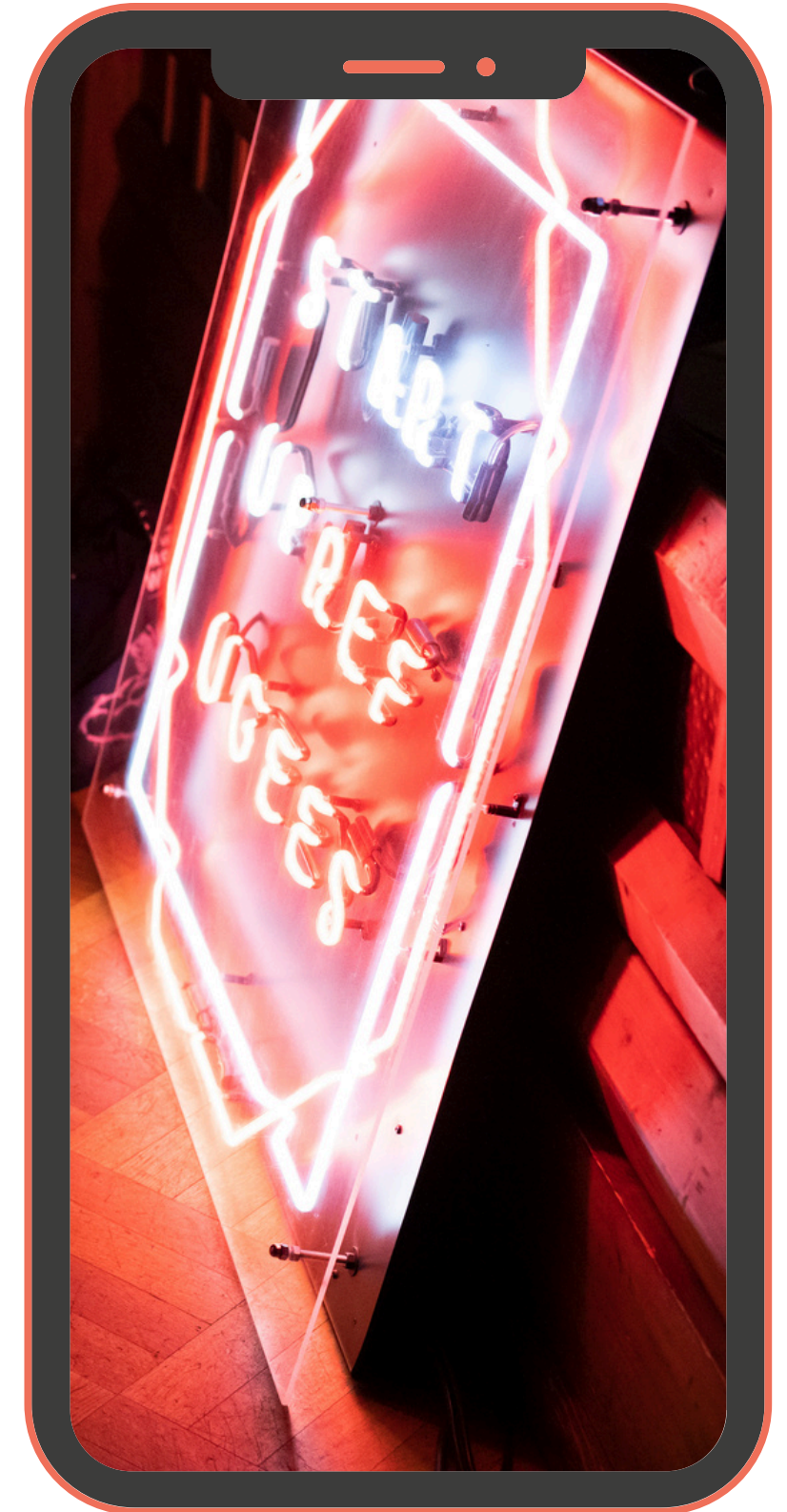
## Ten-Year Anniversary

In 2025, we celebrated 10 years of building futures and creating opportunities, growing into a nationwide network supporting thousands of refugees, asylum seekers, and migrants in employment, skills development, and entrepreneurship.

We organized a celebration gala for more than 200 of our network members at Home Hotel Jugend last October. The gala was hosted by one of our founders Riku Rantala, accompanied by DJ Renaz and a live performance by Hassan Maikal.

During the evening we heard stories of how Startup Refugees has supported newcomers over the past decade to find their professional voice and place in Finnish society.

As part of the celebration, Startup Refugees Fund awarded its largest-ever grant pot, with amounts ranging from €5 000 to €16 000, supported by Tieto, RELEX Foundation for a Better Future and Saber Kordestanchi.

# RECRUITMENT TEAM SOUTH

## Program Results

In 2025, the Recruitment Team based in Helsinki strengthened its role as a trusted bridge between employers and international talent.

The year combined strong employment outcomes with deeper employer collaboration, inclusive recruitment initiatives, and important geographic expansion across the capital region and Turku.

Our work continued to focus on translating skills into concrete employment opportunities while providing personalised, long-term guidance to jobseekers navigating an increasingly complex labour market.

Behind each employment result is a process of coaching, preparation, employer dialogue, and trust-building.

## Recruitment opportunities, South

Recruitment opportunities spanned **hospitality**, **facility services**, **manufacturing**, **logistics**, **administration**, **technology**, and **skilled trades**, alongside **specialist** and **expert-level roles**. This diversity reflects both the breadth of talent within our network and growing employer confidence in our matching processes.

Inclusive recruitment remained a strategic priority. Our collaboration with IKEA through the Equal Start! programme focused on equitable internal recruitment and inclusive career development. We supported the drafting of job advertisements, participated in interviews, and provided guidance on fair selection practices across several cities. During Pride Week, we organised a job fair connecting LGBTQ+ jobseekers with inclusive employers, reinforcing our commitment to equal access to employment.

Employer engagement was further strengthened through four Business Breakfast events addressing inclusive recruitment, artificial intelligence in hiring, workplace belonging, and discrimination faced by young immigrant professionals.

These events strengthened partnerships and positioned Startup Refugees not just as a recruitment partner, but also as a key player in discussions on fair employment practices.

Innovation and internal development were central in 2025. We delivered AI training to ensure ethical tech use in our services and provided DEI training for companies. In collaboration with Scope Impact, we facilitated co-design workshops for the Halla Health self-care app, where participants contributed as paid consultants.

Geographically, we achieved key milestones. We relaunched operations in Turku with the City of Turku Employment Services, opened a new office in Vantaa, and started supporting Vantaa's employment services. Major employer collaborations included Lidl, TechClass, Loisto Settlementti, Bolt, and IKEA.

In 2025, we demonstrated that sustainable employment outcomes are built on long-term employer relationships, personalized guidance, inclusive hiring, and continuous development.



# RECRUITMENT TEAM NORTH

## Project Results

In 2025, our team focused on strengthening employment pathways for newcomers in Lapland and Northern Finland, with particular emphasis on Rovaniemi, Oulu, Kuusamo and surrounding areas. Our work responded directly to the realities of the region: a highly seasonal labour market, strong employer demand during peak periods, and newcomers navigating work in Finnish and multilingual environments.

Throughout the year, our approach was hands-on, needs-based, and realistic. We worked closely with jobseekers, employers, education institutions, and local partners to turn opportunities into employment outcomes while fostering long-term confidence and labor-market attachment. Support included tailored CV feedback, interview prep, guidance on Finnish workplace culture, and assistance with seasonal contracts and job transitions.

Beyond job-search help, we provided emotional support during periods of fatigue, helping individuals stay motivated and resilient.

Expansion into new fields, including solar panel installation and renewable energy-related work as well as increased restaurant-sector recruitment in Oulu for candidates with basic Finnish skills.

## RISE PROGRAM



In addition to direct recruitment efforts, we enhanced jobseekers' readiness through the RISE program in Oulu. This program equips participants with job-search tools and confidence-building in a peer setting, crucial in Northern Finland where networks are smaller and recruitment processes can be harder to access. Feedback highlighted the value of recruiter-level insight, CV and cover letter improvements, and the feeling of not being "alone" in the integration journey. Networking was a key takeaway, with many leaving sessions "more motivated" and "more confident." While many contracts were seasonal or fixed-term, they often served as stepping stones, boosting confidence, understanding of Finnish working life, and job-search skills.

## ARCTIC MENTORS



A key achievement in the North was the completion of the Arctic Mentors 2024 project, which brought together key stakeholders to develop strategies for improving immigrant employment and fostering diversity. The first cycle of Arctic Mentors concluded, and a second cycle was launched, involving 40 mentoring pairs across various fields, including IT, tourism, healthcare, HR, entrepreneurship, education, and more. The program was particularly valuable in the Northern context, where professional networks are smaller, and personal connections are essential for career development. It helped participants expand their networks and gain valuable insights into their fields, contributing to long-term integration and employment success.

# REFLECTIONS

Language adaptation is demanding but transformative. Many non-native Finnish speakers find working in Finnish overwhelming and may leave employment to join integration courses. Those who remain through the adaptation phase report improved confidence, more spontaneous language use at work and in daily life, and increased motivation to continue studying Finnish.

Even short or seasonal roles can have long-term impact when combined with guidance, reflection, and follow-up. Employer relationships are long-term investments. Sustained cooperation, such as the long-term collaboration with companies like Ikea, Tieto, Ekovilla, Netlight NClean, has resulted in stable and impactful outcomes.

Through the different mentoring programs, mentees gain access to professional networks and real work environments, helping them understand expectations, workplace culture, and everyday realities in their fields. Personal referrals improve outcomes.



Mentor recommendations increase access to internships, particularly in regions where recruitment relies on trusted relationships. When mentees feel supported, their confidence and initiative grow, leading to more active networking and job seeking.

Our experience shows that inclusion is possible even in seasonal and linguistically demanding labour markets when support is practical, honest, and sustained.

# SKILLS DEVELOPMENT

## Skills Development Team

In 2025, our focus was on developing and testing new service models, reaching new customer and beneficiary groups, and strengthening the practical impact of our work in employability, skills development, and mentoring.

Throughout the year, we combined proven training formats with first-time initiatives, laying a solid foundation for future scaling and long-term impact.

## Operational Results

During the year, we delivered a wide range of in-house training activities focused on employability, job search skills, and integration into Finnish working life.

These different sessions mentioned on the right supported participants at different stages of their employment journey, from understanding Finnish working culture to developing practical job search, networking, and interview skills.

## Regional Expansion and Activities focusing on the Youth

We delivered training activities in Turku and organised three targeted workshops focusing on career counselling and job search skills in Finland, mock interviews and professional networking. The workshops were tailored to local needs and implemented in close collaboration with city stakeholders. Throughout the year, we combined proven training formats with first-time initiatives, laying a solid foundation for future scaling and long-term impact.

We also organised Dream Workshops for young refugees living in Järvenpää and Sipoo. The workshops focused on inspiration and motivation, exploring future pathways as well as skills awareness and career aspirations.

In addition to structured training and mentoring programs, we organised and facilitated information sessions, hackathons and various thematic workshops with a total of 365 participants.

### Overall Reach and Feedback:

We had almost 1 000 participants in different trainings and events throughout the year, excluding customer support. Participants valued the practical activities, mentoring, and support, noting boosts in confidence, skills, and job readiness.



## Mentoring Programs

During the year, we successfully piloted three mentoring programs in different fields:

1. ICT Mentoring Program with Netlight & Tieto
  - 26 mentor–mentee pairs
  - Included our first-ever hackathon
2. NGO Mentoring Program with Amnesty, Plan & Diakonissalaitos
  - 21 mentor–mentee pairs
3. Engineering Mentoring Program with a Finnish construction company
  - 6 mentor–mentee pairs

A total of **53** mentoring pairs participated in the program. Six months after the 2024 cohort, **14** out of **25** mentees had secured employment, resulting in a **56%** employment rate.

# ENTREPRENEURSHIP

## Entrepreneurship Team & Operational Results

2025 focused on development and new openings. We strengthened and expanded our entrepreneurship courses, making them more accessible to a wider range of aspiring entrepreneurs, and developed new AI training to support our clients in business development. The year also marked the successful completion of several projects with strong results, while further strengthening both international and national cooperation with practitioners supporting entrepreneurship.

## Working with Partners

The **AMBITIOUS** project, funded by the Erasmus+ programme, was implemented in partnership with Startup Refugees, Forward·Inc, and PLACE Network. The project strengthened the capacity of organisations supporting migrant entrepreneurs by developing practical training resources on online facilitation, innovation and leadership, and business idea testing. Through transnational collaboration, three open-access training manuals and a facilitation toolbox were co-created and piloted across Europe.

In total, **39** trainers participated in Training of Trainers activities, and **64** migrant entrepreneurs took part in innovation and business idea testing training. The project improved the quality, inclusiveness, and sustainability of entrepreneurship support while strengthening European cooperation within the migrant entrepreneurship ecosystem.

We also organized **16** events supporting migrant entrepreneurs in rural Finland through the SISU project and produced videos with local experts to share tips, tools and inspiration. Partners included Leader Viisari ry, Northern Central Finland Vocational College (POKE), and the Äänekoski Entrepreneurs Association, and was co-funded by the European Union and the ELY Centre.

## NETWORK & PARTNERSHIPS

Businesses play a critical role in turning integration into a shared success story. Supporting Startup Refugees is a concrete way for businesses and organisations to challenge existing labour market inequalities and demonstrate leadership beyond compliance in their social responsibility, sustainability, and diversity efforts.

Diverse, mobile talent is a permanent reality of the modern workforce. Companies that learn today how to support refugee career mobility are better prepared for the future of work — adaptable, inclusive, and competitive. Consumers also increasingly prefer brands that demonstrate social responsibility. For businesses in Finland, this is not only the right thing to do: it is the smart thing to do.

In 2025, we had four corporate partners who supported us financially with a total of 32 000 euros. In addition, companies and organizations donated to the Startup Refugees Fund and sponsored the ten-year anniversary events. Altogether, 66 000 euros were collected through partnerships, sponsorships and donations from organisations and companies in 2025.

In addition, we formed around **30 pro bono** partnerships with organisations and companies wanting to use their staff, skills and resources to support Startup Refugees' work. These pro bono partnerships benefited hundreds of newcomers and are worth tens of thousands of euros.

We have offices in Helsinki, Vantaa, Oulu and Rovaniemi but our network expands beyond those specific cities and even beyond Finland. This year we had activities in **74 locations**, of which 36 are outside Finland.



## Refugee-Friendly Employers Initiative with UNCHR

In 2026, we partnered with the UN Refugee Agency UNHCR to launch the Refugee-Friendly Employer Pledge.

The initiative highlights companies that are committed to supporting refugees in their long-term integration, career development, and advancement within the workplace. Through a structured selection process, six companies were recognized for their commitments for 2026: *IKEA Oy, StaffPoint Oy, Bolt.Works Oy, Ekovilla Oy, Learning Intelligence Group / Claned, and UBSolar Finland Oy.*

As part of the recognition, the companies committed to concrete and measurable actions. These include increasing refugee representation in their workforce, facilitating the employment of refugees into mid-level roles, and providing structured career development opportunities.

Several companies pledged to offer paid language learning during working hours, while others committed to training their staff in trauma-informed and inclusive leadership practices.



In addition, companies are supporting skills development through apprenticeships, upskilling programs, and access to digital learning platforms, as well as creating clearer internal career pathways.

The purpose of the initiative is to move beyond individual employment outcomes toward systemic change. By working closely with employers, the UN Refugee Agency UNHCR in cooperation with Startup Refugees aims to ensure that refugees can access meaningful and sustainable careers, while supporting the development of a more inclusive and competitive Finnish labour market.

For companies, participation offers an opportunity to access diverse and often underutilized talent, respond to workforce needs, and strengthen their organizational resilience. At the same time, it allows them to take a proactive role in shaping more inclusive workplace practices and contributing to long-term social and economic impact.

## FINANCE & PEOPLE

In 2025, Startup Refugees' funding was a blend of private and public sources, complemented by fundraising and service sales with an overall budget of **1.25 million euros**.

Our strategic goal for service sales was **75 000 euros** for 2025 and we managed to sell more than **100 000 euros** worth of services mainly to cities and municipalities. At the same time several major grants we applied for were rejected.

The result for the 2025 financial year was **-195 102,70 euros**. The negative result had largely already been anticipated in the budget, according to which the surplus from 2024 was used in particular to maintain the Skills Development Program and operations in Oulu during the temporary gap in project funding. In 2026, the situation will stabilize, and there will be no need to use equity to sustain operations.

The employment program and activities supporting the professional skills of asylum seekers were primarily financed by grants from STEA and the European Social Fund (ESF). The business program received its largest grants from the Private Entrepreneurs Foundation and the Ministry of Education and Culture.

Additionally, the year saw some donations and other small-scale grants and joint project fundings.

The strategic goal in the strategy for 2024-2025 was to develop staff skills and know-how to provide better service. In 2025, the staff development was supported throughout the year by various training and learning opportunities. The whole staff received training in innovation, AI & ethics, work ergonomics, cyber security, communication, psychological resilience, partnership management, and in DEI. In addition, the team leaders received training about leading work ability and wellbeing, and few teams received tailored team coaching.



In 2025, 32 regular staff members were employed across Helsinki, Vantaa, Oulu, and Rovaniemi, including one intern. In addition, 30 hourly employees, called Community Leaders, assisted occasionally in employment program activities, such as at events and in workplace orientation.

During the year, we continued to strengthen our organisational structure and regional presence. A new office was opened in Vantaa in August, marking an important step in expanding operations and accessibility in the capital region. To support the organisation's growing scope and strategic priorities, two entirely new roles were established: People & Culture Manager and Senior Specialist, Fundraising and Service Design. These roles were created to reinforce internal development, wellbeing, and long-term sustainability, as well as to strengthen fundraising capacity and service design expertise.

In addition, a new Career Coach joined the Rovaniemi office, further enhancing local support services and capacity in Northern Finland. Alongside these developments, two employees were on part-time study leave during the period, reflecting the organisation's commitment to continuous learning and professional development.

## STARTUP REFUGEES BOARD

The board had six meetings in 2025. The chair of the board is Elisa Vepsäläinen and the board was joined by two new members: Shadia Rask and Saber Kordestanchi. The board currently consists of Elisa Vepsäläinen, Antti Innanen, Camilla Weurlander, Reetta Rätty, Shadia Rask and Saber Kordestanchi who cover a wide range of expertise such as leadership, international recruitments, entrepreneurship, immigration, research, communications, journalism as well as diversity and inclusion themes.

The auditor for the year 2025 was Christian Klemetti from Tilintarkastamo Klemetti Oy and the vice auditor was Lotta Kauppila from Tilintarkastusrengas Oy.

In 2026, Startup Refugees will strengthen its core programmes in employment, skills development, and entrepreneurship while building a more sustainable funding base through service sales and partnerships. We aim to expand inclusive recruitment and training services across Finland, deepen employer collaboration, and enhance the use of the Match platform.

At the same time, we will actively advance advocacy and strategic partnerships to promote equal access to meaningful professional opportunities for newcomers.
